# ACADEMIC PROFILE

I specialize in four core fields of Political Science:

- 1. Decision-Making, Foreign Policy and Crises in World Politics.
- 2. Arab-Israel Conflict Studies.
- 3. Research Design, Methodology and Simulations in Political Science and International Relations.
- 5. Media and Crisis
- 6. Innovative Learning and the use of simulations to teach World Politics

In my research I apply classical International Relations theories and add a new touch to cumulative thinking: My writing covers political realism - the core of paradigmatic international relations studies as well as new approaches -- to the definition of crisis (a system's definition of an international crisis - with Professor M. Brecher 1986), to crisis theory (by introducing the concept of opportunity crisis) and to crisis research by broadening its scope to territoriality and ethnicity in protracted conflicts.

Currently I am on the international board of the **International Crisis Behavior** (**ICB**) **project** of which I have also been among the leading scholars involved in the building of the project and have participated in its collection of data and theoretical developments. This involvement included both theoretical contributions to the project and methodological skills that were helpful in the structuring of the database, covering all international and regional crises over the period lasting from 1918 until 2003.

The Arab-Israel conflict is a leading sub-domain of my work. I focus on two distinct aspects of the conflict: the micro and macro levels. The decision-making level is addressed in the Israeli Attitudes to the Palestinian Issue (IAPI) project, constructed together with Dr. Yehudit Auerbach. This project encompasses the attitudes of leading Israeli decision-makers on the Palestinian issue from 1967 to the post-Oslo period. It includes comparing and contrasting three pairs of leaders (Alon and Peres, Begin and Dayan, Sharon and Rabin), in an effort to reveal patterns of continuity and change in attitudes. At the macro-level, I have completed a book-length manuscript on *The Arab-Israel Conflict Transformed: Fifty Years of Interstate and Ethnic-State Crises*, co-authored together with Professor Shmuel Sandler.

In the process of academic teaching and research, I have constructed theoretical frameworks for the analysis of ethnicity, territoriality and opportunity in crises, and developed operational tools such as the **Crisis Magnitude Index (CMI)** to measure the severity of international crises and the **Attitude in an Existence Conflict (AEC)** to measure attitudes in a protracted conflict. These developments made extensive cross-regional comparative research possible. The same is true with respect to the study of political attitudes and Israeli politics towards the Palestinian issue over more than twenty years. More specifically, I have researched several distinct fields of international relations:

- 1. Territoriality, democratic peace and international conflict.
- 2. Ethnic and political non state actors in world politics.
- 3. The Clash of Civilizations: past and future.

The first of the three research topics listed above focuses on classical realist theories of international relations. Studies on the **Democratic Peace and Territoriality in the Arab-Israel Conflict** have been published and is now extended to a full observation of democracy, territoriality and conflict over the 1918-2014 years.

Since 9/11 and taking into account the recent rise of Daash ISIS, many events in the Middle East and beyond highlight the salience of Non-State Actors (NSAs) in world politics. I am now working on a research project that will map the universe of NSAs, with special attention to the three groups: Non-violent political NSAs, Ethno-National Actors (ENAs) and Terror NSAs. This research focuses on the role and behavior of **Non-State Actors (NSAs)** and is designed to illuminate the goals, power, cohesion, legitimacy and behavior patterns of non-state actors in twentieth century world politics and beyond. Once these research objectives are met, I will compare the trends in different geographic regions, inquire into the similarities and differences in various subsystem power configurations and at the global level, and will address the issue of change in NSA role and behavior over time and location.

The **Clash of Civilizations** thesis raised in the 1990's led to an extensive theoretical debate and lately to a group of empirical studies that tested the validity of this theory. Though results so far have shown little support for the link between civilization membership and international conflict, I argue that this lack of support should not lead us to discard the entire theory. Culture and civilizations may be more important or less, but they are, for sure, difficult to conceptualize. At present my goal is to create operational indicators that will lead to a testable model of civilizations and international conflict.

In the course of the academic research mentioned above I have built three databases: PLO behavior, Israeli Attitudes on the Palestinian Issue (with Dr. Auerbach) and sections of the ICB project in which I have participated. I have has been awarded research grants for building the first two databases mentioned above. Additionally, I has published various works that are derived from an analysis of these databases. In my publications I combined qualitative and quantitative analysis in order to help achieve the goal of knowledge accumulation in international relations. This research approach reflected the early experiences of my post-doctoral studies abroad: at University of California, Berkeley and in Columbia University in New York.

As part of my academic work I combine teaching (both undergraduate & graduate levels), research and supervision of student research (Graduate and PhD. theses). In addition to conducting lectures for courses such as Introduction to International Relations, and Introduction to Political Science I also lead undergraduate and graduate seminars such as International Crises and Non-state Actors in World Politics. I also direct two compulsory research design courses for graduate students who are writing their MA thesis (beginners and advanced). During the 2004-2009 years I formally served as the MA advisor for the political studies department at Bar Ilan University.

Media and Crisis is a research area I probe to enrich the study of international conflict, crisis and war by looking at how the media exacerbates or plays a moderating role in the buildup of escalation processes. This venture is conducted in collaboration with Chanan Naveh and its rather unique contribution is based on a comparative overview of printed media from within the Arab-Israeli conflict – In Hebrew and Arabic, and outside it, in English. The systematic analysis of texts and photos over an extended timeframe from 1947 to the current period adds new insights on media management, change in media regimes, the characteristic media functions in the different media organs observed and the question of a single mode of crisis reporting that persists over time and space. As an interdisciplinary topic, this research contributes to the consolidation of data and theory in the fields of international relations as well as communications.

Innovative Learning and the use of simulations to teach World Politics has developed from an experimental initiative conducted face to face and on Facebook with Chanan Naveh, in Israel and with colleagues from universities abroad to a book length manuscript - World Politics Simulations in a Global Information Age - and an ongoing collaborative project. The use of simulations to teach world politics allows students to try out the

theoretical concepts they had learnt, to revisit historical periods of the past and to apply distinct paradigms in an effort to manage conflicts and find some solutions to immediate problems. By bringing together students from Israel and abroad, all participants take part in an intercultural exchange, communicate in English as a common language, but promote values, goals and policies of the states, non-state actors or media organs they represent. This protracted interaction, beyond lecture time, provides insights to the difficulties, complexities and frustrations that often occur in the real world. So the study of politics is made real and some training is advanced on the core topics that the simulation covers.

To further develop the use of Simulations, face-to-face, and on social networks, a book length manuscript I published on *All the World's a Stage: the Theater of Political Simulations*, applies case studies selected to cover two different views of world politics: traditional and complex: Munich, 1938 on the former, and Palestine Partition, 1947, and Syrian Civil War 2011-2019, both on the latter, with an emphasis on civil wars in the Middle East that include failed states, Intergovernmental Organizations (IGOs) and Non-State Actors (NSAs), as central contenders alongside states.

In my teaching I also integrate the use of an internet website that I have built and update regularly. I have also participated in computerized simulations. As early as the 1980's my students had taken part in the ICONS project with the University of Maryland in suburban Washington, D.C. This project was conducted during a time when interstate teaching communication was a dream for but a few in academics.

As a consequence of using innovative learning methods and simulations, I became more aware of barriers students have to cope with in academe, leading to a new research interest on how to promote a more equal academic landscape, and the publication of "Broadening the Reach of International Simulations to Overcome Accessibility Barriers",

The students I supervise in their MA and PhD. research gain from this rich background and diversity in research topics. In my work with this new generation of future researchers I am devoted to helping bring up a new group of young scholars with whom I have also started conducting joint research.

As the granddaughter of Eliezer Ben-Yehuda who is considered to be the father of modern Hebrew language, I have started a book-length manuscript on the life-project of my grandfather, evaluated from a political science standpoint. The manuscript is entitled: *Public Diplomacy from Vision to Reality: Eliezer Ben-Yehuda and the Zionist Revival*
